Winners of Annual IHS Alum Award Recognized at Dinner

The first nine winners of the annual Charles G. Koch Outstanding IHS Alum Award were proudly honored during the 50th Anniversary Dinner program. The award, announced a decade ago at the Institute's 40th anniversary gala, is named for businessman Charles Koch in recognition of his long-standing support for IHS.

Each year, the award is given to an alumnus who is making significant contributions to advancing liberty through research, teaching, writing, leadership, or financial contributions. In the order of their naming, the winners:

David Schmidtz is a scholar and academic entrepreneur of the first order. The Kendrick Professor of Philosophy and joint professor of economics at the University of Arizona, he founded the university's Freedom Center in 2008.

John Hood is president and CEO of the John Locke Foundation, North Carolina's market-based think tank, and a prolific commentator in print and on television.

Peter J. Boettke is a leading scholar in the contemporary Austrian school of economics and an inspiring teacher and mentor, serving as the BB&T Professor for the Study of Capitalism at George Mason University and as vice president for research at the Mercatus Center.

Scott G. Bullock is one of the merry band of litigators for liberty at the Institute for Justice, which he joined at

its founding 20 years ago. He argued the Kelo eminent domain case at the Supreme Court and then took that fight to the states to win victories for property rights.

John Tomasi is an entrepreneurial academic innovator, founding and leading the Political Theory Project at Brown University, where he is a highly popular professor of political science.

Kristina J. Kendall has worked with John Stossel since graduating from college, producing his shows at ABC and now at Fox Business Network as executive producer. Kristi is a great mentor to young journalists in the IHS network.


Todd J. Zywicki is a Foundation Professor of Law at George Mason University, a leading scholar on bankruptcy and consumer credit, and an active commentator on those issues on Capitol Hill and in the media.

Kris Alan Mauren is a premier institution builder in the freedom movement, helping to found and build the Acton Institute for the Study of Religion and Liberty as its executive director.

Randy E. Barnett is the Carmack Waterhouse Professor of Legal Theory at Georgetown University Law Center and a relentless champion of liberty through his teaching, writing, and advocacy of "the rights retained by the people."

IHS Celebrates Five Decades and Launches the Next

ore than 625 friends of the Institute for Humane Studies gathered at the Mandarin Oriental Hotel in Washington, DC, in October to celebrate the Institute's 50th anniversary and kick off a new decade. The evening started with reflections on IHS's founding and ended with a call to rally around major new initiatives.

Emcee **Megan McArdle** wove a humorous narrative through the program. IHS President **Marty Zupan** recalled that when IHS started up in a garage in California,

"It was but one man and an inspiration": founder Baldy Harper, and his vision for a unique organization to cultivate champions of liberty. Asking the nearly 300 IHS alumni in the room to stand and be recognized, she observed: "We're not one man in a garage anymore!" Indeed, IHS alums now number more than 12,000, with 2,800 active in careers in ideas.

Television journalist **John Stossel** and star economics professsor **Walter Williams** offered tributes to IHS's

work—and alum **Andrew Kirell**, who studied under Williams and now works with Stossel, attested to IHS's help in "making my dream come true." More alum stories followed—from philosophy professor **David Schmidtz**, an alum of the '80s; from *his* student, **Christopher Freiman**, now a professor himself; and from student activist **Sloane Frost**.

Following dinner, winners of the annual IHS alum award were recognized (see page 5), and Professor Randy Barnett introduced IHS Chairman Charles Koch, bringing down the house when he observed that the two knew each other when "I was just a law student and Charles was just a millionaire."

Mr. Koch explained that he has been "devoted to IHS and its vision" for more than 45 years "because its work is *fundamental* to everything else that needs to be done to restore our free society. Without the best ideas and people with the intellectual horsepower and skill to advance them, all our other efforts will be for naught."

After guests expressed their appreciation with a standing ovation, Ms. Zupan returned to the podium to say that "the new urgency of the battle of ideas lit a fire under the IHS team," resulting in major initiatives to educate, equip, and engage orders of magnitude more talent.

She announced a two-year Champions of Liberty Campaign with the goal of raising \$20 million, and thanked lead contributors to the campaign—Charles Koch, the Humphreys family, Art Pope, Richard Uihlein, an anonymous donor, and Frayda and Ken Levy. Frayda Levy offered an inspiring story about IHS's impact and asked others to join in supporting the campaign, which Ms. Zupan noted has already been blessed with \$15 million in gifts and commitments.

"Tonight we celebrate," she said in closing. "Tomorrow, we rise with the same energy, dedication, and passion as our founder—to achieve a society of enduring freedom, prosperity, and peace. *Thank you for being part of our endeavor.*"
